
Figure 1. Prisma Flowchart showing final results

Table 3. Three level command and control leadership structure

Level	Description
Gold – Strategic level	Involves senior professionals, provides extensive support for operational commanders, and is responsible for setting the strategic tone of the multi-agency response
Silver – Tactical level	Involves chief operating officers who manage and coordinate activity at the incident site.
Bronze – Operational level	Is primarily concerned with the operational delivery of the strategy which is direct patient care in the case of the Covid-19 pandemic (LGA, 2021).
